





The Republic of China Air Force's (ROCAF's) 7th Flight Training Wing has painted three F-5E/F Tiger IIs in a special scheme for Taiwan's 'Tiger Meet' - held during an open day at Zhihang Air Force Base. The three aircraft comprise single-seat F-5E serial 5291 and two-seat F-5F serials 5395 and 5403. The fuselage of each jet has been painted in a tiger stripe scheme, symbolising the presence of the Tiger II at Zhihang Air Force Base.





AN INTERESTING ANECDOTE!


Following skirmishes between North and South Yemen in 1979 the US government rushed into North Yemen 12 F-5Es, and Saudi Arabia sent 2 F-5Bs. Taiwanese sources state 12 ROCAF pilots, plus ground technicians, arrived in North Yemen as no Yemenis were trained to fly and maintain the aircraft. Change in political alliance brought Taiwan to oppose the 1993 Desert Storm war, in which Yemen secretly planned for the Taiwanese to bomb Saudi targets! Alarmed, Taipei immediately recalled the pilots!








This scheme was first publicly demonstrated in November 2009 but was discontinued in late 2010 because of complaints of its similarity to a character in a children's TV series.





ASIAN AIR ARMS UPDATE—1

INDIA





India's dual programme to introduce Boeing's AH-64E Apache and CH-47F Chinook rotorcraft has cleared a significant milestone, with first examples of each type having been flown for the first time. Boeing on 27 July released images of the attack and transport helicopters, each sporting a grey livery for future Indian air force service. Their debut flights were conducted in Mesa, Arizona and Philadelphia, respectively. Source: Flight Global Aug 2018



The Indian Air Force is currently in the middle of a major modernization program of its 118 Jaguar ground attack lighters. The \$3 billion program sees that the aircraft will be fitted with new engines, airframes and spares and will be upgraded with new evionics, communication and AESA radars. The effort will probably continue for the next 5-years and will extend the operational life of the aircraft for another 20-years. Main contractor will be India's state-owned Hindustan Aeronautics Limited which will receive decommissioned Jaguar fighters from France and Oman free of charge and will buy more planes from the UK at a throwaway price.

INDIAN BORDER SECURITY FORCE

Russian Helicopters has announced delivery of six overhauled Mi-17-IV helicopters to India's Border Security Force. Work on the helicopters were carried out at Novosibirsk Aircraft Repair Plant (NARP).

All six helicopters were originally supplied to the Border Security Force on a loan basis by the Indian Air Force for internal anti-insurgency operations.



SOUTH KOREA



South Korea has decided to purchase the Boeing P-8A Poseidon as its new fixed-wing maritime patrol aircraft (MPA). A report from the Yonhap news agency indicates that lawmakers today chose in favour of the 737-based MPA as part of an acquisition project that could be worth US\$1.7bn. It's believed the order is for four aircraft.



ASIAN AIR ARMS UPDATE—2

LAOS



Several re-furbished Mi-17s have been returned to Laos. According to Russian Helicopters, the LPAAF aviation fleet comprises over 20 civil and military helicopters produced by the company's subsidiaries. In addition to Mi-8/17 type helicopters, the country operates medium-utility Ka-32T helicopters. The LPAAF ordered 12 Mi-17-IVs from Kazan but only six were delivered: the others were cancelled due to a shortage of funds. One Mi-17-IV has since been written off. More modern Mi-17V-5 versions are also apparently active — unconfirmed reports suggest five examples in use.

PHILIPPINES

The Philippines air force has taken delivery of two Indonesian Aerospace produced NC212i tactical transports.

The two aircraft were delivered to Clark Air Base outside of Manila, says Indonesia's defence ministry.

The ferry flight from the IAe's factory at Bandung took four days and involved three stops.

The aircraft were originally slated for delivery in 2017, but this was delayed, reportedly owing to issues with the autopilots aboard the two aircraft.

In April 2013, Airbus Defence & Space (then Airbus Military) entered a deal with IAe to develop the type, an upgraded version of the C212 tactical transport. The two companies first announced plans for the NC212i in November 2012.





The Philippines is set to receive several retired turboprop light attack aircraft from the US Air Force. The aircraft to be delivered have been retired from the US military since the mid-1990s, will be provided to the Asian nation for free as part of a general assistance package to the country's military. The aircraft will be a mixture of two OV-10A and two OV-10G+ aircraft formerly operated by NASA. Modifications to the aircraft include a L3-Wescam MX-15Di Electro-Optical turret, Link 16 tactical datalinks, full-motion video, a glass cockpit and the ability to fire the BAE's APKWS GPS-guided rocket. The Philippines is the last operator of the OV-10 Bronco, with its air force currently operating between eight and 10 aircraft. The new aircraft are expected to be operational in early 2019.

TAIWAN

The initial Republic of China Army AH-64E attack helicopters are now fully operational. The Apache Guardians, operated by the 1st Group of the 601st Aviation Brigade in Longtan, declared full operational capability on July 17. All Taiwanese Apaches are incorporated into the 601st Aviation Brigade and are divided into two groups. The 2nd Group attained initial operational capability last year.





BACKGROUND TO INDIAN AIR FORCE AND NAVAL AIR ARM MARKINGS COURTESY OF MEMBER MICK BURTON OF BRIGHT SPARK DECALS

Member Mick Burton in the guise of Bright Spark Decals has, over the years, produced highly accurate and well-researched decals, supported by extraordinarily informative notes. Mick has kindly given me permission to reproduce here those notes pertaining to his decals of modern Indian military markings. Ensure you also click on the links below to learn more about the topic. Whilst the Indian decal sheet referred to below is now out of print, it might still be found via sources such as E-Bay. Should there be reasonable demand, Mick might well consider a re-print. See page 8 for his latest decals.



BS.1 (3rd issue) and BS.1A (2017)

Indian Air Force and Naval Air Arm Markings

These sheets were produced to meet the need for Indian roundels in both the saffron/white/green colours used since 1948 and the Asoka Chakra applied to aircraft in the period after WW.2. The British influence on the IAF shows when the roundel and fin flash sizes are collated, as the vast majority of British types use the same sizes as the RAF, with the same standard sizes being used on other machines. The table lists the majority of types, but it must be borne in mind that there are variations: two being the C-17 and C-130, both of which use a slightly different proportioned roundel. The green on the fin flash is almost always to the front of the aircraft, but again there are examples where this was not the case.

The blue Chakra was the first marking used by post-independent India after WW2 and was applied to the aircraft marked */**on the list, however, the Spitfire T.9's and Tempests were painted in England prior to delivery using the green/saffron version. The blue Asoka Chakras may require an Insignia Yellow background which will need to be added by the modeller themselves, either as a painted disc or cut from solid decal sheet and applied first (the Olfa Cutter is a useful tool for both) with a 3 inch (approximately 1 mm in 1/72nd) border. Some, especially those with a silver finish, dispensed with the yellow background, resulting in the base colour showing through the design's "spokes".

The saffron/green roundels supplied on decal sheet BS.1A are for use on the low visibility Sea Harriers used by the Navy: there is no white middle ring, and, although the colours seem subdued on photographs, this is apparently because the aircraft are not too clean!

The "INDIAN AIR FORCE" and "NAVY" titles in black, in both English and Hindi, are generic and have been sized and styled to best represent those that have been used over the years.

The "SURYAKIRAN" and its Hindi counterpart are sized to fit the Team's Hawk T.132's in 72nd scale, and "INDIAN NAVY" will suit Navy Seahawks, Alizes and other types.

Indian Air Force serials, along with early Navy serials, also seem to follow RAF influence, and these are available on Modeldecal 33 to 36A, 48A, 58 to 61, obtainable from Hannants. Additionally there are numerous free fonts available for download from the internet for self-printing serials on clear decal film.

These roundels may also be used for other scales, e.g. a 36 inch roundel in 1/72 is 24 inches in 1/48.


